## **From the Desk of the Rabbi** ***Yizkor-It's Important!***

As we are receiving this month's bulletin we are in the intermediate days of Pesach and I hope everyone's Seder(s) were fulfilling and meaningful. As we move forward to the remaining days of Pesach, we find the 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> days fall on Saturday and Sunday and we hope to have a nice showing at Shul for these services.

The significance of the 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> days of Pesach cannot be understated. The 7<sup>th</sup> day (Biblically commanded by Hashem) in Israel is the last day of the festival. It commemorates the miraculous deliverance of our ancestors when confronted by the Egyptian Army led by Pharaoh himself. According to the Sages who calculated the time of travel from Egypt to the Sea of Reeds, it was determined that this journey occurred in exactly 7 days. It was on this day that Hashem parted the sea and again, redeemed the Israelites from destruction at the hands of the Egyptians.

We commemorate this miraculous deliverance by reading from Parsha B'shalach in the Torah. The Shir Ha'yam or Moses' Song of the Sea was chosen as the Torah reading for the 7<sup>th</sup> day and such a fitting reading it is. We usually read this responsively in English every Shabbat and its poetry truly describes the greatness, mercy and power of Hashem. It is not surprising that this Torah reading became a cornerstone prayer in the ending section of the Preliminary Service, even on a daily basis, let alone Shabbat and Chagim.

While Israel may be done with the Chag at sundown this Shabbas, the Jewish people in the Diaspora observe an additional day added on to not just this Festival, but all festivals in the Hebrew calendar, with the exception of Yom Kippur. The basis for this is how long in ancient times it took from the declaration of the holiday by the Sanhedrin who resided in Jerusalem to the time it took to declare the holiday as far as Babylonia and Egypt where the majority of Diaspora Jews lived over 2000 years ago. It is in this tradition that we who live outside of the land of Israel still observe this ancient practice.

Surely we know in this modern techno age we live in down to the minute and second literally when the holidays start and end. Traditional Jews of the Conservative and Orthodox movements however still observe this practice. The one thing added to the sanctity and solemnity of the 8<sup>th</sup> day is the Yizkor Service. In Israel, they recite Yizkor on the 7<sup>th</sup> day of the Chag.

Originally Yizkor was only recited on Yom Kippur, and its primary purpose was to remember and honor the deceased by giving Tzedakah. This tradition extended to the Shalosh Regalim; or 3 pilgrimage Festivals; Sukkot, Passover and Shavuot because they had similar themes of tithing.

Of course for Yizkor we need a minyan and I hope on this Sunday you will be able to join us for the 8<sup>th</sup> day of Pesach for our services. Contrary to the Minhagim of many traditional Shuls, it is an old superstition, or as we say in Yiddish; a Bubbemeises concerning a person who tempts the Ayin Ha'ra or "the Evil Eye" and attends a Yizkor service whose parents are still alive.

There is no Halachic requirement for those whose parents are alive to leave the Yizkor Service. However, if it makes you uncomfortable to do so, please remember while you may not have the need to say Yizkor for a close family member, there are many of our brethren and sisters who perished in the Shoah and previous calamities that have no one to say Yizkor for them. You would be performing a great Mitzvah to stay and recite Kaddish for them. After all, we are Israel; we are all connected to each other, we are one Mishpacha.

As we wade through what is hopefully the ending throws of the COVID-19 pandemic, it is my sincere wish that everyone stays healthy and may we start to see a semblance of normal return to our everyday lives, including our participation and involvement in our Shul. May this come speedily in our days.

## Online Resources: A Lifeline for At-Home Jewish Education by Kimberly Walls

During the past year we have all come to rely more and more on online resources. Since our synagogue has not opened up for Sunday school yet, I just wanted to share a list of resources that I have used with my young children during this time.

At the top of my list of go-to websites is PJ Library. From their website: "PJ Library sends free, award winning books that celebrate Jewish values and culture to families with children from birth through 12 years old." PJ Library also has PJ Our Way that lets kids aged 9 to 12 choose a chapter book of their very own.

Besides sending out books to Jewish children PJ Library has many valuable resources on their website that are free to use. Topics include "How to Talk to Kids," "Activities," "Recipes," and "Jewish Values." Once you sign up and are on the PJ Library mailing list you will get invitations to online events. Some of the events our family has enjoyed were a webinar presented by PJ Library and MIT where the kids learned to make dreidels out of pencils and cardboard with coins or paperclips for weights. There have also been interviews with children's book authors and a Virtual Musical Seder for Passover that featured Rick Recht, Ellen Allard, Elana Jagoda, Joanie Leeds and many other well known Jewish children's music performers.

Another fun online resource is BimBam.com. Whether you are looking for a bible story or Jewish values, BimBam has got you covered. The kids love to watch the two "sparks" Gabi and Rafael "who live in a play-house in the clouds and help a regular family that makes a lot of meshuga (silly) mistakes." The animation in these videos is high quality and every production is enjoyable.

If you are interested in brushing up on your Hebrew reading skills – for yourself or for the kids – check out the National Jewish Outreach Program and Twebrew School. No that is not a typo! Twebrew school was started in 2012 to work within the parameters of Twitter. Thus they are short lessons with videos. Head over to <https://njop.org/hebrew/twebrew-school/> to find all the lessons that go along with the Reishith Binah text book that is available to download. Rabbi has also used this with our elementary students in their Hebrew lessons, so we can work on it at home until everyone is back in the classroom with Rabbi.

When you are done studying Hebrew and learning about Jewish values unwind with a little music at [jkidsradio.com](http://jkidsradio.com). JKids Radio is another service of PJ Library. You can find Jewish music streaming 24/7 and there is even a Sleepytime Mode that you can switch on at nap time or bedtime. Even Mom and Dad will find something they like on here. Oh, and they even have an app that you can put on your phone!

The reading list with tentative dates for book club meetings for 2021 is as follows:



**YOU ARE RESPONSIBLE for YOUR PERSONAL HEALTH  
CAREFULLY WEIGH RISKS BEFORE CHOOSING TO ATTEND SERVICES IN-PERSON**

- Do not plan to attend services in-person if:
  - You currently have COVID-19
  - You know you have been exposed to COVID-19 within the last 14 days
  - You have fever or have had fever within the last 14 days
  - You have health conditions that put you at increased risk for COVID-19 infection/complications
  - You are unwilling, as a matter of personal choice, to wear a face mask or face shield in the building
- All persons ten years of age and older are required to wear a mask at all times when in the synagogue. Wearing a face shield that wraps around the sides of the wearer's face and extends below the chin is acceptable for those persons who have personal medical or physical difficulties that prevent them from safely wearing a mask. However, either a mask or a shield is required at all times in all locations, including the sanctuary, all hallways, and other rooms within the synagogue building. Our services are on-line for those who cannot wear either.
- To reduce droplet spray effectively – sneeze/cough into your elbow, even when wearing a mask.
- Check your temperature at home just before you come to the synagogue to assure it is within the normal range.
- Use hand sanitizer immediately when you enter the synagogue.
- Wash your hands or use hand sanitizer before touching your eyes, nose, and mouth.
- Maintain at least six feet between you and other congregants.
- Family members may sit in seats beside each other but must socially distance six feet from other individuals.
- Seating arrangements require one empty row between occupied rows.
- Three empty seats are required between individuals and between individuals and family groups.
- Parents are responsible to supervise their children at all times and to assure the children comply with social distancing requirements when around other congregants who are not members of their family.
- The total number of seats and seating arrangements are necessarily limited to approximately 35 adults and their accompanying children due to distancing requirements. So long as we can maintain one row and three seats between family groups and individuals, we will gladly seat additional attendees as they arrive, so please arrive at 9:00 AM for services to assure your seat and to be present to help us make minyan for Torah services.

**NOTICE – You are responsible for your own health. The synagogue is not responsible for and cannot assure your health and safety relative to COVID-19 exposure. COVID-19 can be totally without symptoms in some people (asymptomatic). An asymptomatic person carrying active COVID-19 may be completely unaware that they have the virus, which is why everyone is required to wear a mask or face shield when inside the synagogue to protect themselves AND others. Additionally, if you are in a high-risk group or have health issues, we strongly recommend that you weigh your specific risks very carefully before choosing to attend services or other group activities.**

Upon entering the synagogue, one is welcomed by a beautiful, wooden tree, with golden leaves. This tree is our Tree Of Life and is a way to honor, thank, congratulate, show love, and/or appreciation for a living person in your life. Let's fill our Tree of Life with lots of joy and happiness.

To help you with your wording, please look at the leaves currently on the tree. You will notice that the fewer words, the better, as the letters are larger and can be seen more clearly. We encourage you to follow this formula when you plan the wording for your leaf. If there are too many words, you will be asked to revise the wording and I will give you suggestions for changes. Remember.....simple is better!!
