From the Desk of the Rabbi

CHAMETZ IS STRICTLY FORBIDDEN

Recently, I was in Dallas for a Beit Din and I heard Tom Thumb was offering quite a few Kosher foods for Passover. Since I was planning on picking up some briskets and other Kosher foods I cannot get locally, I figured I would pick up a few things early this year. Up north, in Rock Island, Illinois, when the local Albertson's and HyVee grocery stores brought their "Passover" items in, there was little more than two product displays, one each at the end of a grocery aisle. Forget about Kosher meats! That was 2.5 to 3 hours away in Des Moines or Chicago.

Keeping strict observance for Pesach was challenging years ago for my family, and I suspect for my father's and grandparent's generation, it was even more difficult. When I checked out Tom Thumb, they had at least 4 sections of Kosher for Passover foods, half as long as their own aisles with end cap displays on each section. In my father's day, there was a very limited diet to choose from, and outside of the Seder, the main menu was soup, soup and more soup with Matzah.

Okay. There were also fried Matzahs (Matzah Brie), which were pretty tasty, but after, say, the third day, we were reaching for the fruit compote that our mother and Bubbie had been trying to push into us since the Seder. These days, things are a lot different. After looking at Tom Thumb's offerings, anyone who claims they will suffer and starve for Pesach...well, I would say you have got to be kidding me!

I have heard it said many times by many people that Passover may be losing its original flavor—that the Passover of today, with its availability of Kosher for Passover products, has lost its true significance. In former years, there were no such things as Kosher for Passover canned fruits, packaged cakes, candies, chocolates, and the like. Back then, it is believed, people really knew they were celebrating Passover! Today, it is contended, the only thing that is missing is bread. And, they add, rather sarcastically, it won't be too long before we will have a Kosher for Pesach certification for that, too!

I maintain, if the significance of Passover must be based upon an austerity program, then it contradicts the true meaning of this holiday. Self-denial and physical hardship were never meant to be the goals of the Passover observance. Instead, it is our G-d-given freedom from these things that we celebrate. It is Chametz and its various derivatives that Torah commands us forsake on Passover. We are most fortunate to be living in that period of human history when food science has progressed enough to provide a wide array of Chametz-free dishes to make our holiday more comfortable and easier to celebrate.

Pesach is the holiday of freedom, symbolizing our casting off the yoke of physical oppression. Yes, we labor furiously to Kasher our dwellings to remove the Chametz and, at the same time, removing some of the arrogance we have built up over the last few months since the High Holidays. This activity allows us to touch and communicate with Hashem on a greater spiritual level.

The Seder table, with its variety of symbolism, is aimed at helping us to get out from under the slave mentality. The scrumptious foods we are served at the Passover meals are certainly far from indicating self -denial. Instead of deploring the wide, new vistas of culinary pleasure open to us through the miracles that G-d has given humanity, in the form of scientific advances, we are obligated to take full advantage of them and bring home to our families the idea that Judaism, in its very essence, is a religion of cheerfulness and

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Co-President's Message

Our CAA Brotherhood is sponsoring a Shoah Yellow Candle program for our congregation. I was not very aware of the program, so it was time to do some research. I was so impressed with the program, I wanted to share some of the history with you.

"Over seventy years ago, half of the earth's Jewish population perished at the hands of another ■ Amalek, an Austrian house painter who seized control of Europe and threw the earth into darkness. God's light unto the other nations flickered but did not die. A new, modern Exodus arose from the depths of despair and tragedy. From the ashes of Europe, survivors of the Holocaust, or Shoah, made their way towards new lives. Emigrants dispersed around the world, to the new State of Israel and to the western hemisphere. In these places, they began to rebuild shattered lives. In the following decades,

survivors asked another question. How could Yahrzeits be observed for those victims whose entire families had been wiped out? An idea was born, a special memorial candle with vellow wax, in remembrance of the vellow stars forced upon European Jews in the 1930s.

The Yellow Candle™ was created in 1981 by FJMC clubs in Canada, New ■ England and elsewhere to keep alive the memory of the Six Million who perished in the Shoah. The Candle is modeled after a traditional Jewish memorial Yahrzeit candle that burns for 24 hours during periods of mourning and on the Yahrzeit anniversary of a family member. The candle's yellow wax serves to remind us of the yellow arm band which Jews were forced to wear during the Nazi regime. A photo on the candle container shows young people visiting Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camp. This reflects \overline{lack} the importance of teaching our youth the lessons of the Holocaust and of remembering the Six Mil-□ lion. In addition, the program logo is a yellow Magen David (Star of David) outlined with barbed wire, with the word "Jude" in the middle. This preserves the memory of the armband or cloth patch that Jews were forced to wear in the ghettos of Eastern Europe."

It is suggested that an \$18 donation (Chai translates to "Life") be left for the Brotherhood to allocate to Holocaust Remembrance entities to further education in our community and beyond. Please speak with our Brotherhood President, Wally Newsom, for further information. Often the candles are delivered in other communities prior to Pesach as there are only a few days before Yom Ha'Shoah following Pesach.

ABOUT CHAMETZ

What do we actually mean when we say chametz? Any flour of the five species of grain, which is mixed with water and allowed to ferment before being baked, comes under the definition of chametz according to the Torah. The five species of grain are wheat, spelt, oats, barley, and rye.

The Sages established that the time necessary for the fermentation process to take place is eighteen minutes after water has been added to the flour; i.e., if water is added to the flour and nothing else was done to the mixture for eighteen minutes, the mixture becomes chametz.

The time when the mixture is being processed, kneading and rolling it out, is not part of these eighteen minutes. However, once the dough has been kneaded, we are careful not to leave it for a moment. By kneading it or otherwise working with it, the fermentation process is delayed and the mixture will not become chametz.

If the flour was mixed with only fruit juice or with eggs, it does not become chametz. However, because we fear that the water may inadvertently be mixed with the fruit juice or with the eggs, we do not do this; moreover, some authorities hold that fruit juice does ferment.

Chametz may not be consumed on Passover, either by eating it, or dissolving it in water and drinking it, and no benefit may be derived from it. It must be either burned or destroyed of in some manner.

Even a minute particle of chametz is forbidden on Passover. Even if the amount of chametz in a mixture is only 1/1000th of the total, the entire mixture is forbidden as chametz!

However, if chametz became mixed into food before Passover, it is nullified, provided that it is less than 1/60th of the volume of the entire mixture and that it has become completely dissolved into the mixture and cannot be discerned.

It is forbidden to eat chametz from midday on the fourteenth of Nissan, that is, from the beginning of the seventh hour. One who transgresses this prohibition is subject to lashes according to the Torah, for the verse states (<u>Deuteronomy 16:3</u>): You shall not eat chametz with it [the Paschal sacrifice]. The traditional explanation for this verse is that the prohibition of eating chametz starts from the time when the Passover sacrifice could be offered after midday of the fourteenth of Nissan.

The Sages, in order to prevent people from transgressing the prohibition inadvertently, decreed that the prohibition of eating chametz begins at the beginning of the fifth hour and the prohibition of deriving benefit from chametz starts at the beginning of the sixth hour. Thus, during the fifth and sixth hour the prohibition is Rabbinic; after the sixth hour the prohibition is from the Torah.

One who willfully eats a piece of chametz which is as big as an olive, from the night of the fifteenth of Nissan until the end of the twenty first of Nissan incurs the penalty called *karet*, Divine excision, for the verse states: For whoever eats chametz, that soul shall be cut off from Israel (Exodus, 12:15). 

One is permanently forbidden to derive any benefit from chametz which remained in one's possession during Passover. This prohibition is a penalty which the Sages levied to punish the person for having transgressed the Torah prohibitions of not seeing or having chametz in one's possession during Passover.

This penalty applies whether the chametz remained in his possession on purpose or by accident or through oversight. The Sages levied this penalty so that people would not leave chametz in their possession for use after Passover (ibid.).

SALE OF CHAMETZ - DEADLINE MONDAY, APRIL 18TH, 2019

Any Chametz owned by a Jew during Passover Week becomes "Trefa" and is forbidden for actual use or benefit forever. It is usually impossible to dispose of all Chametz before Passover, so every Jew should arrange for a formal Mechirat Chametz, or sale of that Chametz.
