From the Desk of the Rabbi

OUR VERY BEST SHAVUOT

We all stood at Sinai.

It is taught that all souls then and yet to be born were present at the giving of the Torah at Har Sinai. There and then, we were all considered “Jews by Choice,” converts to Judaism, because only after the gift of the Torah, were we gifted with the twin paths of spiritual and Jewish law.

Because conversion is one of the Book of Ruth’s central themes, it is only fitting that we read the Book of Ruth on Shavuot. Coincidentally, Shavuot also happens to be the day of Ruth’s great-grandson King David’s birth and death. This is the tradition we observe when celebrating this holiday today. However, Shavuot in our Torah was designed as one of the three pilgrimage festivals; all of which were directly tied to agriculture.

The beautiful Festival of Shavuot, which we shall celebrate from June 8th through 10th, originated in the Bible as Yom Ha’Bikkurim, The Festival of First Fruits. It was customary for each Israelite to make a symbolic gift from among the earliest portion of the harvest, and to make a pilgrimage to offer that gift before G-d at the altar. The Bikkurim thus became consecrated as a form of thanksgiving for the success they enjoyed. It served as a hopeful symbol of their expectations for a bountiful harvest yet to come.

The language the Torah uses to instruct us in the Mitzvah of Bikkurim is itself fascinating and illuminating: “You shall bring the choices of your First Fruits to the House of Hashem your G-d (Ex.23: 19, 34:26). It is necessary to translate and interpret the passage in this way, because the word Bikkurim, itself, already means ‘First Fruits,’ and it would be senseless and redundant to render Ray’sheet as “the first of your (First) Fruits.”

With this word construction, the Torah is trying to impress upon us the importance of doing our very best when we appear before G-d. The Torah commandment is quite clear; “Three times a year will all my males be seen at my holy place”. This commandment is found three times in the Torah as well. Twice in Sefer Shemot and once in Devarim!

But is it only on the Festivals, alone, that we are to do our very best?

It is not only on Shavuot or, for that matter, on any other Chag, that we are expected to do our very best in life. Somewhere, implicit within the words of our tradition, is a clear understanding that we will always put forth our best effort, whether in the religious or secular spheres of life. Striving for excellence in this world has and continues to be the mission statement of Sinai. “Tikkun Olam,” for example, is not a new term in our modern day vocabulary.

We often see in our world today many remarks, sometimes said in jealousy, thoughtlessly and even boldly anti-Semitic, concerning the success Jews seem to enjoy. However, our collective and individual successes, both historical and modern, should not be kept secret. The study of the Torah teaches us to be this way.

Torah commands us to be literate: “You shall teach them diligently to your children”. From the youngest possible age up, we are teaching our children to be literate in the Torah and that means literate in life. We are taught to challenge everything; question everything!

To be a Jew means to strive and give ones best. Sooner or later, with this way of life, success and blessing comes with this ambitious perspective (with Hashem’s help, of course). To do less not only places oneself at a disadvantage in life but is also a waste and rejection of our G-d-given talents. It is an affront to G-d, who gives us life with the expectation that it will be lived fully, usefully and within our capacity, successfully.

We are a chosen family – each one of us has made a conscious choice to be part of this Congregation. Each one of us is integral in making our synagogue a home for worship, for learning, and for caring.

Be sure to come out on Saturday evening, June 8th, as we celebrate Shavuot with the reading of the book of Ruth with congregation participation. We will also have the first Consecration Service within the Shavuot service, at least in the recollection of this generation. With the giving of the Ten Commandments which are the basics of Jewish learning, we also wish to celebrate the Hebrew students who are currently working on their studies in Hebrew language and prayer, along with those students who will begin in the fall. We are currently blessed with a significant group of young people who are interested in learning Hebrew and working toward their Bar or Bat Mitzvah. Following the services, we will celebrate with an Oneg in the Social Hall. We hope to see everyone turn out for this service and come back the next morning on Sunday, June 9th to continue our Shavuot observance.

Let us not repeat the mistake of our ancestors at Har Sinai when according to the Midrash. They “slept in” the morning they were supposed to receive the gift of the Torah and had to be awakened by a shofar blast from G-d.

Let us show Hashem our very best and say on Shavuot: Hineni! Here I stand! Ready to embrace the Yoke of Heaven!

CONGREGATION AHAVATH ACHIM**RITUAL PARTICIPATION GUIDELINES**

The Ritual Committee honors tradition and embraces innovation. As our congregation continues moving toward greater inclusion, the following are offered as guidelines to ritual life at Ahavath Achim, effective April 14, 2019.

Everyone Can:

- Stand or sit on the bimah (whether the Torah is in or out of the Ark, as long as it is dressed).
- Lead a congregational reading (in English or Hebrew). Designated English readings which may be led by a non-Jewish individual include the prayers on pages 148 and 149 in the Siddur Sim Shalom for Shabbat and Festivals, or other English readings approved from time to time by the Ritual Committee and the Rabbi.
- All children are invited to come up to the bimah for the Adon Olam or Yigdal.
- Participate in the presentation of a tallit to a B'nei Mitzvah child.
- Recite the Mourner's Kaddish.
- Touch the Torah during the processional or recessional.
- Participate in dancing and singing, even in ritual settings where the Torah is present (e.g., Simchat Torah), but not carry a Torah.
- Participate in (add a name to) the Mi Sheberakh, prayer of healing list (and request a name be included during the Mi Sheberakh part of the service).

Only Jewish Individuals Can:

- Wear a Tallit.
- Be called to the Torah for an aliyah.
- Read from the Torah.
- Open or close the Ark.
- Lead a prayer service.
- Carry, lift, or dress the Torah.
- Carry and hold the Torah during processions and/or dancing.

LIFE CYCLE EVENTS:Everyone Can:

- Participate in the life cycle events of their children (see above guidelines).
- Have Ahavath Achim clergy officiate at a graveside funeral or unveiling following Jewish traditions of burial.

Only Jewish Individuals Can:

- Be married by CAA clergy in the synagogue or other settings.
- Have funeral services and be buried in the Ahavath Achim cemetery.

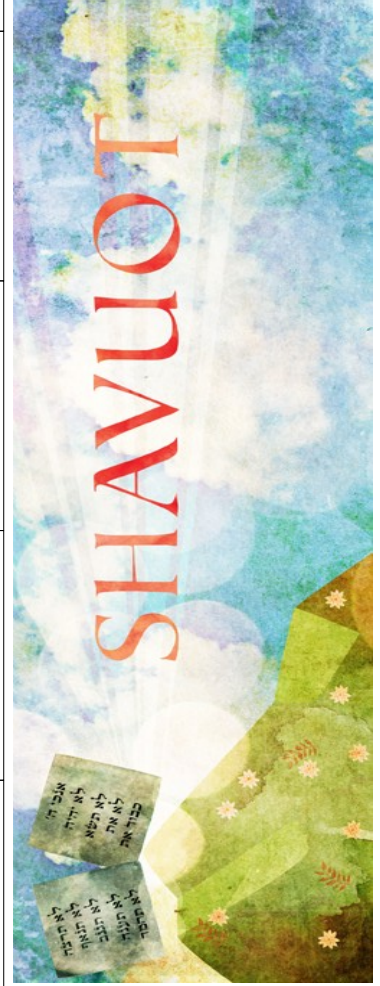
PARTICIPATION GUIDELINES (NON-RITUAL)Everyone (Members and Non-Members, Jewish and non-Jewish) Can:

- Dedicate a plaque for the Simcha Tree
- Participate in the Memorial Book
- Participate in all adult education-oriented classes (e.g., the Rabbi's Torah study sessions)
- Participate in a Hebrew learning class
- All children may participate in the salting of bread during Kiddush
- Sponsor a Shabbat brunch
- Patronize the synagogue's gift shop

Note: the above is meant to be a dynamic list and can be added to or modified as agreed upon by the Ritual Committee and the Rabbi, and approved by the Board of Trustees.

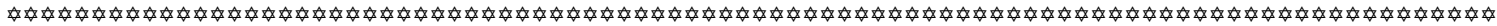
