From the Desk of the Rabbi SHOULD WE BELIEVE IN MIRACLES?

Miracles do not fall under the jurisdiction of the special effects crew on a movie set no matter how technically advanced they become. Traditionally, Judaism has always been very suspicious of miracles. Unlike Christianity; a religion which is based on the notion that faith requires a person to believe in something which defies logic and the natural order, Judaism has always sought to view the world through the prism of "reality." In fact, our sages often understood passages in the Bible which dealt with miraculous events as metaphorical or symbolic. They were not so quick in believing the notion that Hashem altered nature for miracles to occur.

Menachem Mendel also taught: "If you don't believe in miracles, then you are an atheist." Why? Because, the truth of the matter is that life is not what it appears to be on the surface. There are "miraculous events and moments in this world." But let's understand how Judaism defines something as "miraculous."

There is a story about the great Abraham Joshua Heschel who was invited to deliver a lecture. When he arrived at the lecture he declared: "I just experienced a miracle before coming to this lecture." Naturally, there was dead silence. After all, this was Abraham Joshua Heschel, one of the great spiritual figures of the 20th century. What could he have possibly experienced a single witness could describe as a miracle? Heschel said: "The miracle was that the sun rose this morning. And if you can't see that as a miracle, then you don't have a Jewish understanding of the miraculous."

It is no accident the word "miracle" is not a Jewish word. Miracle is defined by the dictionary as "an extraordinary event manifesting divine intervention of human affairs." The Hebrew word for miracle is Nes. Nes means a sign, something significant. The birth of a child is as much a miracle as any miracle I know, but there's nothing supernatural attached to it. It is a part of the natural order of the universe set into existence by Hashem. In order for something to be significant it need not violate the laws of logic or the laws of nature.

To be a Jew means to view the ordinary as extraordinary: a child's smile, the voice of the wind in the trees, the morning light, the emotions which flood into us when we see the bloom of flowers, the petals of a rose, the glow of a rainbow through the prism of a drop of water as the sun shines through it. These are the real miracles of life and Judaism trains us not to miss their significance. That is why there is a Bracha; a blessing for everything under the sun. No blessing in life should go unappreciated.

In our current times, we are witnessing some very challenging obstacles as we work diligently to stay healthy and safe as the COVID-19 pandemic continues to test our faith, our congregation and our country. So far, Baruch Hashem, it is a miracle one of our members is safe and recovering from the virus. It is a miracle we welcome a new baby girl into our congregation. It is a miracle as we see in the news every day, people who are recovering and being reunited with their families. The sun still continues to come up every morning.

Once we were able to move through that process, I thought we had taken care of all the bumps in the road could possibly arise – that is until October 2018 when the tragic shooting at Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh brought the possibility of violent anti-semitism home to us in Tyler, Texas. Suddenly we were inundated with materials about how best to protect our little family Shul. To help us work through that Tim Birmingham stepped forward to share his expertise in safety and security, which had been his career. Watching our small congregation pull together, consult with experts, take on responsibilities that were new to each of us and continue to provide spiritual leadership was amazing! We have developed many routines for safety with a core of people providing support. Moving through this period was momentous!

From there, what else could happen before my retirement as Co-President – smooth sailing! Until COVID-19 threatened everyone around the world! Even here in Tyler, Texas! As we have always been such a close worshiping family, it was a major decision to shut down and not be able to engage as we have in the past. But even out of that, some of us experienced our first virtual Pesach online with Rabbi Learner. And the joy this past Shabbat as those who were not at risk were able to come to CAA to worship in a new manner, exercising safety and social distancing. It was a real blessing!

I look forward to experiencing continued growth and special occasions at our synagogue, and letting others take on the roller-coaster ride of leadership!


