From the Desk of the Rabbi TO FAST OF NOT TO FAST

Whether it is young children in our Talmud Torah or adults learning in the various classes we offer at the Shul, the study and observance of our many life cycle holidays are woven into our curriculum. In the midst of studying about these wonderful, joyful holidays, there are also days of national mourning, also known as fast days. All of these fast days with the exception of Yom Kippur are strictly rabbinical in their observance. Even the Biblically mandated commandment concerning the observance of Yom Kippur found in the Torah became subject to interpretation by the Sages to mean that you practice self-denial. Fasting was implied with that commandment.

Out of all the fast days, only Tisha B'Av has the same level of observance as Yom Kippur when it comes to fasting. The other minor fast days are from sun up to sundown and the prohibitions of work do not apply. For those who observe this practice, it can be a very trying time in the summer months as we all know how important it is to stay hydrated in the hot Texas summer. Those of you who cannot fast for medical reasons are exempt from this practice. For those of you who are able, I encourage you to try. Many things other than the destruction of both temples have occurred on this major fast day. Even the nine days preceding this day are considered to be days of intense mourning and with the exception of the Shabbat, even meat and wine traditionally are not to be consumed during these nine days.

Why should Jews observe the various fast days and what should they meant to us in these times that we live in? What lesson should this solemn day of Tisha B'Av teach us that we can apply to our current times? The traditional answers that have been offered for centuries establish the pattern of rabbinic observance that most of us have come to accept as Halacha.

Mourning the destruction of both Temples in 586 BCE and 70 CE should be just cause to warrant the need to observe this solemn day. There are also many other calamities which have befallen our people on this day in our long history. This day in our calendar year allows us to reflect on our past; reminding us what we do not have in our lives today as an inheritance. While Jerusalem may have been reunified in the 6 day war, and we have the Kotel for worship, it is not the same as what the original Temple meant to us.

However, can mourning on an annual basis for something that was lost nearly 2000 years ago appear to lose its impact and meaning to us today? The further we go from these two pivotal moments in our history, is it possible we can fall into a state of apathy where we begin to ask the guestions; what does it mean to me? What does it mean to you? This is not something that happened in our parents' or grandparents' time where you have living witnesses to those times.

I see the observance of this rabbinic practice as being very plain and straight forward. The Sages teach in Tractate Gittin in the Talmud; Sinat Chinam (The baseless hatred of Jew against Jew) was the cause of the 2nd Temple's destruction and our current exile from the land. This is a prime example of what happens when the Jewish people do not stand together and remain dedicated to the principle that Israel is our Jewish homeland, and Jerusalem is Hashem's Holy city. There His presence dwelt among our people for the entire world to see.

We see division today among Jewish people and it is the very reason that our enemies are scope-locked with the anti-Semitic rhetoric of our current time. Whether it is the BDS movement, or individuals who keep coming out with revisionist historical propaganda, the Jewish people must stand united! The various political parties that exist in Israel today speak volumes on how divided our people can be.

Perhaps we should consider this perspective in our time. While each of us may mourn in our own way during Tisha B'Av, let us not focus on what was lost, but focus on why it was lost. If we can eternalize this and work towards correcting this destructive behavior, perhaps then we can offer this prayer and may it go from our lips to Hashem's ears; "May this be the last Tisha B'Av that we have to observe in mourning. May we see the redemption of Zion soon in our lifetime. May next year be the day when Tisha B'Av goes from a day of mourning to a day of rejoicing the likes of which the world has never seen."

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Co-President's Message

Dr. Ron Beals recently shared an article with me written by Rabbi Sacks titled "Things Life has Taught Me About Judaism" (http://rabbisacks.org/things-life-has-taught-me-about-judaism/) Please take time to read the whole article at your convenience. I have bookmarked it myself. I just want to share parts of the article with all of you.

"Never ever be embarrassed about being a Jew. Our people has survived so long and contributed so much, that you should see being Jewish as an honor and a responsibility. Some people look down on Jews: they always have. In which case, we have to walk tall, so that, to see our face, they are forced to look up.

Never compromise your principles because of others. ... Non-Jews respect Jews who respect Judaism. They are embarrassed by Jews who are embarrassed by Judaism.

Never look down on others. Never think that being Jewish means looking down on gentiles. It doesn't. Never think that being a religious Jew entitles you to look down on nonreligious Jews. It doesn't. The greatest Jew, Moses, was also, according to the Torah, "the humblest person on the face of the earth". Humility does not mean self-abasement. **True humility is the ability to see good in others without worrying about yourself.**

Never stop learning. ...

Never confuse righteousness with self-righteousness. ...

Whenever you do a mitzvah, stop and be mindful. Every mitzvah is there to teach us something, and it makes all the difference to pause and remember why. Mindless Judaism is not good for the soul.

Don't worry if you can't keep up with the congregation. One word said from the heart is greater than a hundred said without understanding or attention.

G_d lives in the space we make for him. Every mitzvah we do, every prayer we say, every act of learning we undertake, is a way of making space for G_d."

The Safety Committee continues to implement improvements to the buildings and grounds in support of various safety initiatives. New initiatives include projects currently underway, such as leveling the south sidewalk to eliminate a tripping hazard caused by ground settling. The labor for the sidewalk project is provided by congregant volunteers. Other projects include installation of emergency evacuation hardware and lighting improvements on the grounds around the synagogue perimeter. A recent parking lot striping project includes reserved spaces for handicap parking, thus assuring access for congregants and guests with additional mobility requirements.

In order to provide access to the Handicapped Access parking spaces and make the drive in front of the synagogue more orderly, we are asking everyone who comes through the circular drive to enter on the north end driving south as to the parking lot. Thank you for helping with this new expectation.




Cooking With the Sisterhood

CORN PUDDING

2 cans creamed corn
2 eggs or 1/2 cup Egg Beaters
1 thsp. to 1/4 cup sugar (to taste)
2 to 3 Tsp. flour of breadcrumbs or
matzo meal
