## **From the Desk of the Rabbi**

### WHAT IS YOM KIPPUR REALLY ABOUT?

With virtually all the Chagim falling in the month of October this year, instead of focusing on Rosh Hashanah as I usually do, I decided to break with tradition and offer some words this month on Yom Kippur. After all, it is the pinnacle of the Yomim Norim or Days of Awe. Looking at the HH Machzor for the majority of the service, the main topic upon examination appears on the surface to be: "Sin." After all, how many times do we recite the Al Chet section of the prayer book? The literal translation of Al Chet meaning; "For the Sin."

When discussing the topic of sin, what is the most exposure to the subject that we see today? Very seldom in my experience have I heard sermons from the Bimah blasting congregants with the subject of sin! It's simply not our practice to do so. However, we see many times where fundamentalist preachers with their television ministries seem to reduce religion to their congregants with mindless slogans and the concept of a narrow-minded exclusiveness when it comes to this subject. They think they have the market cornered on this subject and of course; the cure.

We as Jews have never been really comfortable with this word. The terms repentance and atonement have woven themselves into our vocabulary and practice. We approach this in an entirely different perspective compared to our Christian neighbors. Our goal is to suppress the Yetzer Ha'ra or evil inclination. So, if sin is not the focus of Yom Kippur, what should be the goal? Simply in one word: Forgiveness!

From the opening words before Kol Nidre until the closing twilight of Neilah, Yom Kippur is a day wholly devoted to forgiving and being forgiven. One may ask; Why do we need a day like this? Why did Hashem establish this Day of Atonement for our people all the way back to Sinai and for future generations to come?

We really need this day! Perhaps many of us are burdened with bad feelings and simmering anger towards our fellow human beings. You can't keep this bottled up inside. You have to be able to release this anger for the benefit of yourself and others.

On the opposite end, how many of us bear that gnawing guilt because we need forgiveness from someone we have hurt or upset? Yom Kippur is our special day devoted to forgiveness, seeking reconciliation and rebuilding relationships. The Mishneh said it in these words: "For misdeeds between man and his fellow man, Yom Kippur has no effect until one has appeased the other (Yoma 8:9)."

You cannot petition Hashem for forgiveness until you have made the attempt on your end to seek forgiveness and at the same time grant it! Now that I have said what is expected of us, we come to realize it is easier said than done. We the Jewish people have a long cultivated history in the role of playing the aggrieved party. Yet, even when faced with the anti-Semitism of the centuries, our humble poets of every

As in the past, Congregation Ahavath Achim welcomes all out-of-town family members, guests and visitors to our High Holy Day services. Attendance will be complimentary to the following people: (i) full-time students; (ii) Ahavath Achim conversion class students; and (iii) guests who belong to a synagogue in their home area.

Anyone who resides (i) within 90 miles of Tyler; or (ii) 90 miles or more from Tyler and who does not belong to a synagogue in their area, may attend services for a required minimum donation of \$180 per seat. There is no reduction in the donation for services not attended. Children under age 18 accompanying their parents will receive complimentary seats.

While we welcome all visitors, we ask that you please be mindful that our congregation is committed to the principles and values of Conservative Judaism. Violators of our policies will be asked to immediately disengage from such activities or be asked to leave.

<p><b>Fran's Challah</b></p> <p>1 cup warm water plus 1/4 cup for starting yeast</p> <p>2 packages active dry yeast or 2 T. bulk yeast</p> <p>2 eggs lightly beaten</p> <p>1/4 cup vegetable oil</p> <p>1/3 cup plus 1-1/2 tsp. sugar</p> <p>4 to 4-1/2 cups flour</p> <p>1-1/2 tsp. salt or more to taste</p> <p>flour for dusting work top</p> <p>oil for greasing bowl</p> <p>1 egg beaten with 1 T. water for egg wash</p> <p>Makes 2 challah loaves Recipe may be doubled</p> <p>Preheat oven to 325 degrees</p>	<p>Put 1/4 cup warm water in measuring cup. Add 1-1/2 tsp. sugar and the yeast. Stir gently and set aside.</p> <p>Put the remaining water and sugar, eggs, oil and salt in a large mixing bowl and stir well.</p> <p>Stir in 2 cups of flour.</p> <p>Add the yeast to the bowl after it is bubbly and rising in the cup. Stir in 1-1/2 more cups of flour and turn out on to lightly floured work top. Start kneading, working in more flour as needed to form a smooth, elastic dough. (Dough may be kneaded in the bowl for less mess.)</p> <p>Drizzle a little oil in the bowl. Place dough in bowl and turn over so it is covered all over with oil.</p> <p>Cover bowl with plastic wrap and a tea towel and set in a warm corner of the kitchen to rise about 30 to 45 minutes.</p> <p>When dough is visibly rising, shape in desired shapes. Place shaped dough in bread pans or on parchment covered baking sheets and let rise until half again their size. (About 30-45 min.)</p> <p>Bake in preheated oven. Check after 10 minutes and rotate if necessary. Check every 5 minutes thereafter.</p> <p>When lightly browned, brush with egg wash and return to oven. Bread is done when it sounds hollow when tapped.</p> <p>Cool on racks.</p> <p>Store in zipper bags at room temperature or in the freezer up to 3 months.</p> <p>This dough may also be used to make coffee cake, sweet rolls, dinner rolls, or bread sticks.</p>

The magic of flour and water and a few other mundane ingredients magically turning into something so mouthwatering and so meaningful was even more so because I helped to make it. It wasn't Shabbat without the candles, the wine, the beautiful loaves and the blessings that went with them. There was truly a sense of Shabbat being set aside, holy, festive and peaceful at the same time. Making the challah and the special Shabbat foods, cleaning and refreshing the house, and setting the table with the Shabbat table cloth, napkins and dishes, built our anticipation for the beauty and comfort that comes from observing Shabbat.
