From the Desk of the Rabbi

The more I study our beautiful faith, the more I find that there is much that I still do not know. As I sit in this office and read out of the various new books that I have recently acquired, I find myself awed and humbled as I study with the words of our sages; old and new. The insight they possessed and transmitted to words cannot be easily dismissed as fictional works of literature. The many issues that face us today, these men faced even then. Yes, the world was smaller. There was no television, radio, internet, or on-line gaming. People's lives were simpler, but were their needs much different than our needs today? The struggle for the day to day survival of our people still exists both physically and spiritually. We wrestle with our jobs to be successful financially, but at the same time try to stay focused on the meaning of what it means to be Jewish; to be a servant of Hashem.

Whether we realize it or not, we are all servants to something. We are servants to our occupations, to those we support and take care of, to the various things that we desire and bring happiness to our lives. We go to institutions of higher learning to gain greater education whereby we can learn to serve others and make better incomes for ourselves and family. In fact, the pursuit of education is synonymous with the essence of a Jewish home! In the process of being a servant to these things, how often do we consider ourselves servants of Hashem? The answer may be simpler than you think.

When I expressed my desire to my father to learn the mechanical contracting trade and follow in the family business at age seventeen, he agreed to my request subject to certain conditions; Number one; he was the boss and that it was his way or the highway (sound familiar?). Number two; the day was done when he said it was done. Number three; learning the trade was not just during working hours. And finally number four; no matter what the time of day was when that phone rang, I was prepared to go at a moment's notice and take care of people who were in trouble. In fact, my father said to me that if I was not prepared or willing to make the commitment to the fourth condition let alone any of the others, he would not teach me his trade. It was then that I understood what it meant to be a Jew. What it meant to be a servant of Hashem. Interesting how these same conditions mirrored the relationship between Hashem, the Torah and the Jewish people. When it came to the observance of the laws, it was Hashem's way or the highway. When it came to the order of the sacrifices, there was no slacking off of their performance. Learning the Laws was not just an eight hour commitment everyday, it was a 24 hour ongoing education. When it came to being of service to others, these laws applied even toward people that you did not get along with.

When we serve our fellow man, we are fulfilling the mitzvot of being a servant to Hashem. How does one show their love for Hashem? The way that they show their love for people. On the 7th of this month we begin the Hebrew month of Elul. Elul is the month in the Jewish calendar that proceeds the month of Tishri where we celebrate the high holidays of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. During the entire month of Elul in the morning and evening service and going into the month of Tishri we add Psalm 27 to our worship service. There is much allegory and beautiful poetry in this Psalm. The opening verse begins with "Hashem is my light and my salvation". The first part of the verse alludes to Rosh Hashanah and the second part refers to Yom Kippur. The verse "He will hide me in his Shelter" alludes to Succot. The verse

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High Holy Days Service Etiquette

The Ritual Committee met in June to assign aliyot for the coming High Holy Days. We also discussed ways to make our services run more smoothly and we need your help.

First, it is important that the Gabbaim know who will be in attendance for their aliyah honor. Whether you accept or decline your honor, please RSVP to the CAA secretary, Leanne, as soon as possible. You may either call and leave a message or email,903-561-4284 /caasecretary@suddenlinkmail.com

Second, if you have an aliyah honor, please come before the Torah service starts and take a seat on the first row, in front of the bimah, shortly before the Torah service begins. This will keep the service running smoothly and the Gabbaim will know you are there for your aliyah.

Third, both the Kol Nidre service and Mincha (Afternoon) service on Yom Kippur start within 5 minutes of the beginning of the service. If you are over 65 and want to hold a Torah on Kol Nidre or you have an aliyah for the Mincha service, please arrive prior to the beginning of the service.

Fourth, as you enter or leave the sanctuary during services, please be considerate of the other congregants. While it is wonderful to visit with friends and family who we rarely see, it is important that you keep your conversations and your voices to a minimum.

We hope you will accept your High Holy Day Aliyah and we appreciate your help in keeping our services running smoothly.

"Hashem, hear my voice when I call, be gracious towards me and answer me" alludes to the Divine salvation that we seek from Hashem to help us in our struggle against the evil inclination. Then the verse that stands out with the theme of my drash, "Conceal not Your Presence from me, repel not Your servant in anger" fits in with the definition of what it means to be Jew and a servant of Hashem. Here King David identifies himself with being Hashem's servant as well as being a servant of the nation of Israel. He implores Hashem to be with him spiritually and not forsake him.

These few verses stated here are the central themes that we should be concentrating on as we not only approach the High Holidays, but for the entire year as well. Look to Hashem for the light necessary to illuminate your path. Constantly look to Hashem for forgiveness and salvation. When you sit comfortably in your homes, realize it is through Hashem who provides you with the means for shelter. Call out in your prayers to Hashem for the strength to perform mitzvot and lastly, may the Divine Presence dwell within your midst so that you may continue serve Hashem by serving your fellow man with justice, righteousness and love.

Let us all come together on the morning of the 8th where we can usher in the month of Elul with a Tephillin morning service with Hallel, the reading of the Torah for Rosh Chodesh, and the blowing of the Shofar beginning the period of repentance, culminating with the Selichot of Yom Kippur.
