From The Desk of The Rabbi

Every now and then, we approach the month of October where all of our holidays in the seventh month of our Hebrew calendar or Tishrei are over and we enter into the month of Marcheshvan. Virtually every month of the Hebrew calendar has at least one holiday or significant observance in it but not Marcheshvan. To be honest, after the solemnities of the High Holidays, and the festive atmosphere of Sukkot thru Simchat Torah, Marcheshvan seems on the surface to be a bit anticlimactic.

When we consider this seemingly "unimportant" month of our Hebrew calendar, nothing could be further from the real importance that Marcheshvan symbolizes. Marcheshvan is commonly referred to as the "bitter month" because of its lack of what we would define as "Mazel". Even the month of Av, when we mourn the destruction of both Temples and all the other various calamities the Jewish people have historically endured, is not considered bitter.

Naturally, like all the other Hebrew months, the original name of this month was not Marcheshvan. In fact, its original name was "Bul" and refers to the idea of "drying up". For us in the Northern Hemisphere, drying up can be associated with fall. However, in Israel it can allude to something else.

In Israel, this month marks the beginning of the rainy season and leads up to winter. It is from this time up to Pesach that Israel relies on the rains to fall. That is why we recite the verse in the Amidah of "Ma'sheeve Ha'ruach U'mo'reed Ha'Geshem". "You cause the wind to blow and the rain to fall." Rain plays a very important connection to the month of Cheshvan.

Historically, there are major events which occurred in the month of Cheshvan. First was the flood during the time of Noah which began on the 17th of Cheshvan. The following year on the 27th of Cheshvan, the waters receded allowing Noah, his family and all the life that had been saved exit the ark on dry land. The Hebrew word for flood is "Mabul". Hence the connection to the original name of the month.

According to our Sages, the flood was supposed to begin on the 11th of Cheshvan. The reason for its delay was due to the death of the oldest human being who ever lived; Methuselah. Tradition states the flood was delayed so Noah could observe the seven days of mourning following Methuselah's passing.

Second, the 11th of Cheshvan marks the passing of Rachel, Jacob's wife who died giving birth to Benjamin. Both the passing of Methuselah and Rachel were on the same day of the month. Since there are no coincidences in the Torah, what is the connection between these two events and how does this relate to the basis of the month of Cheshvan?

Rachel represents the Jewish nation in exile. Benjamin represents the completed state of the Jewish people living in the Land of Israel. Rachel, who was born and lived her life completely outside of the Land of Israel passed away just as Jacob and the rest of the family were entering into the Land of Israel. The Sages teach Rachel's spirit accompanied the Jewish people as they were exiled to Babylonia and she still weeps for her children until the final redemption.

Benjamin however is the last son of Jacob. He is the twelfth of the tribes and his birth represents the completion of the people of Israel. He also happens to be the only son of Jacob who was literally born in the land of Israel; not outside of it. Later on, in the Tanach, in the book of Samuel, we see King Saul was descended from Benjamin and Mordechai and Esther were descendants of Saul.

Seeing this from the perspective of redemption, the descendants of Benjamin continued to be the Mashiach's of their time. It is tragic that the birth of Benjamin resulted in the very death of Rachel. But we can posit the idea that the exile itself is that which births the redemption. The descent into darkness creates

the potential for the future light.

We can see this same relationship in the story of the flood (Ha'Mabul). While the world in its previous state had descended into darkness and came to an end, there was a new beginning which was being sown in the person of Noah representing the future light for humanity. The very passing of Methuselah paved the way for Noah to assume leadership of the next generation. The death of the previous generation gave rise to a new potential for growth.

Now we can explain the message and meaning of the month of Cheshvan, as it is brought to light by the events that historically occurred in this month. Cheshvan is a month given the title of "bitter," for there does not seem on the surface seem to be any opportunities for growth and spiritual connection. It is a time of drying up or apparent death, as the leaves wither and the world enters a state of deep hibernation.

Yet, it is also a time when the rains begin, when the potential for future growth is being planted. It is a time when spiritual darkness reigns, but also when spiritual growth begins deep beneath the surface. It is the moment when Rachel passes on, when all seems bleak, when the darkness of exile closes in. It's also the moment of the birth of Benjamin, the seed of the Jewish people's perfected state, which is planted in that very darkness.

Cheshvan begins the extended time span between the last festival, Sukkot, and the next, Passover. In the meantime, the spiritual seeds planted during the Jewish month of Tishrei begin to take root – to be watered and to grow, finally appearing and bearing fruit in Nissan of next year. Perhaps this is why we go no longer than six months between Sukkot and Pesach.

The message of Cheshvan is that despite the darkness, and even because of the darkness, there is future growth awaiting us. We have the opportunity to nurture that right at this moment. It is now that we gather the seeds from the holidays of the month of Tishrei, plant them, and carefully water them through the winter months. With Hashem's help, we will soon marvel at the beautiful spring bounty that we merit to cultivate.

None of us know how this wave of the pandemic will evolve. We will obviously monitor the situation and share our thoughts with the general congregation.
