<u>From the Desk of the Rabbi</u> It's All About The Number 3

If you ask the average Jewish person what Shavuot is, most of us in this day and age will say it is about the giving of the Torah on Mount Sinai. However, the Torah does not state this directly. It mainly talks about the counting of fifty days from the 2nd day of Pesach. It is Rabbinic Judaism and our Sages of the Talmud that determined that the holiday of Shavuot and the giving of the Torah both occurred at the same time.

When one considers the time frame chronologically, Shavuot occurs in the third month of our Jewish calendar year otherwise known as Sivan. What is the significance of the third month and is three one of Hashem's favorite numbers? Why wasn't the Torah given immediately? When we examine how much in Judaism connects with the number three, we can see a pattern that Hashem establishes that is more than just mere coincidence.

This point is made explicitly in the Talmud, Tractate Shabbas 88: "Blessed be the Merciful One who gave a threefold Torah to a threefold people through a third-born on the third day in the third month." Notice how the number three is the constant throughout this quote from the Talmud.

Here are some other examples of what comes in 3's: The Tanach is in three parts namely: Torah, Neviim (Prophets), and Ketuvim (Writings). Today we look at nation of Israel as three: Kohen, Levite, and Israelite. Moses was the third born of his family (Aaron and Miriam were born before him). The Torah was given in the third month, and on the third day after which all of Israel had to remain pure in every way. Judaism also alludes to a triad relationship between Hashem, the Torah and the Jewish People. We merited the receiving of the Torah at Sinai because of the covenant Hashem established between our three Patriarchs; Abraham, Isaac, & Jacob.

Why three? The Torah is unique. It is one of a kind. There is no other Sefer like it before and after. Hashem is unique. Hashem is one of a kind. Would it not be just logical that Hashem would have been more focused on the number one? Let us examine this on a month by month perspective.

Nissan is the month of the Exodus itself, when Hashem was revealed to the Israelites. They "fled" from Egypt, both literally and metaphorically—fled first on foot and from the knowledge of the Egyptian world which consisted of many deities. They were then filled only with the revelation that there was only One G-d in the entire universe.

lyar, the second month, is the month wholly taken up with the Counting of the Omer, and preparing ourselves for the coming events at Sinai; Two things that dealt with the physical only, not necessarily the spiritual.

Sivan, the third month, was the time when the Torah was given, when G-d, the Torah and the Jewish people became physically and spiritually one. This was the moment when the world and humanity changed forever.

It has been many centuries since that third month experienced by our people at Sinai. Yet we as Jews today should continue to make every attempt to feel that experience as much as possible, to connect and be one with G-d not only on Shavuot, not only on other holidays, but every day in our life. This is the true meaning of the giving of the Torah: Being a Holy Nation, a Nation of Priests and a Light to the other Nations. Lookout, there is that number three again.

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
