### From the Desk of the Rabbi

At this time of the year, we are either about to or have started into the reading of Sefer Bamidbar. Bamidbar offers at the beginning of the book a wondrous detailed accounting of the people (the males), specifically the numeric values concerning a census for the sole purpose of establishing the military force which will soon go into the land and conquer it.

Out of my daily dose of Torah series that dwells on Parsha Bamidbar, the Mussar thought for the day offers this teaching which comes from the *Shelah Hakadosh* (Rabbi Isaiah Horowitz) who wrote: "Every single member of the Jewish nation is a vital component of it, and each Jew is critical to the Jewish people as if everything revolved around them alone. We must believe this, and act accordingly.

As Chazal (our sages of blessed memory) have taught us, a person must look at the world as if it is half worthy and half unworthy. Thus, if he or she alone were to sin they would tip the scales toward the unworthy, and if he or she were to do just one mitzvah they would tip the scale toward holiness. One must look at themselves as if they had to power to change the world with their deeds, and thus bring favor to the Jewish people and light to the world, in the eyes of Hashem."

Not only did this concept apply to our lives in years past, but now more than ever does it apply to our time today. We see many situations in the world today where people are waiting for the other person to act when it comes down to promoting peace and harmony in the world. We can operate on the premise that as Jews, each of us receives special Divine providence from Hashem because we are Hashem's beloved people, but that does not give us the right of entitlement in believing that providence is owed to us.

In fact, we must reciprocate and use the unique stature we have been given for the purpose of being in service to Hashem and our fellow man. We must look at the perspective as if we ourselves were the only person in the world and our actions were the only ones capable of bringing pleasure to the Creator. We cannot wait or use the excuse: Leave it up to someone else to do. It is because of this unique stature we have been given that drives and motivates our people to be successful in most of all the endeavors that we pursue. It is the actions of one that bears great significance either positive or negative on the Jewish people and the world.

Recently we witnessed the passing of Bernie Madoff. Clearly this man was not the poster child for just a Jew, but how any human being should act in this world. We have all seen where this individual did not perform positive change in this world. Our unique stature and position with Hashem does not give us the right to act like the Bernie Madoff's of the world. In this case, the actions of just one individual have changed the world, have changed the lives of so many good people and have not in a positive way bring favor to the Jewish people in both Hashem's eyes and the eyes of the rest of humanity. How often are the Jewish people judged by the actions of just one? The book of Bamidbar is more than just an accounting numerically of a people; it is a book of how we as the Jewish people should be held accountable for our actions in the first place.

We again have seen another conflict between Israel and Hamas with lives lost on both sides of this current conflict. Always Israel is held accountable for the loss of life and is immediately perceived as the aggressor compared to Hamas who launched their missiles first against Israel. We continue to see the old familiar anti-Semitic tropes that keep playing over and over again with one big difference; members of our own government are spewing these same anti-Semitic tropes. Palestinians who have come to this country to live are attacking Jewish people on the street in retaliation of Israel's right to defend their own country due to the onslaught of Hamas rockets. Is anyone taking these people to task for their acts of verbal and physical anti-Semitism? Are they being held accountable?

Israel has again agreed to a ceasefire with Hamas. One cannot help but see this as one of the many examples of the definition of insanity; "Doing the same thing over and over again and expecting a different result." This ceasefire is not peace. It is not a permanent end to hostility. Hamas is claiming victory. Israel is claiming victory. Hamas still doesn't recognize Israel's right to exist and most likely never will. However, a certain politician claimed there would be no peace with the Arab world until there was peace between Israel and the Palestinians. And we all know that statement has been proven false due to the Abraham accords.

Even when Israel continually takes the "high" road in their approach to war, the outside world doesn't acknowledge it. No, we have people making statements the death toll on both sides of the conflict is not equal. We should stop selling arms to Israel so they cannot hurt Palestinians who voted into power a terrorist entity called Hamas to govern them. If Israel is going to be held accountable for defending itself against Hamas, then the Palestinians need to be held accountable as well. But will they? Will the other countries of this world make the Palestinian people accountable for their actions? So far, they haven't.

Many world leaders, politicians and even religious leaders are quick to set policy on how Israel should do this, and how Israel


