From the Desk of the Rabbi

As you receive this bulletin, we will be in the Hebrew month of Cheshvan. If you look at your Hebrew calendars, you will see after the month of Tishri is over, with the exception of Rosh Chodesh, Cheshvan has no holidays, and no major events. Does this mean the month of Cheshvan is without Mazel? Nothing could be further from the truth!

There are many books on Jewish Mysticism and thought. One of these books is the Sefer Yetzirah or Book of Formation whose origins go back to the Oral Tradition as far back as Abraham. More practically we find it connected to the period of the Mishnah around the second century C.E. Jewish Mysticism can be a very deep involved process to absorb, but with a little reference and explanation, the month of Cheshvan has very deep, spiritual and messianic meaning as taught in the Sefer Yetzirah.

Cheshvan in Hebrew: השנו as it is also known, Mar-Cheshvan, is the eighth of the twelve months of the Jewish calendar. In the Bible, Cheshvan is called the month of Bool בול a name stemming from the word for "flood" or Ma'bool מבול The flood began on the 17th of Cheshvan, and ended the following year on the 27th of Cheshvan. On the following day, the 28th of Cheshvan, Noah brought his sacrifice to G-d and G-d swore never again to bring a flood upon the earth to destroy all mankind, and then revealed the sign of His covenant with the world, the rainbow.

The Sefer Yetzirah states Cheshvan is "reserved" for the time of the Mashiach, who will inaugurate the third Temple in the month of Cheshvan. The letter of the Hebrew alphabet Cheshvan corresponds to is the letter Nun. As a verb-root, nun means "to reign." As a noun, it means "the heir to the throne".

The Zodiac sign for the month of Cheshvan is Scorpio or the Scorpion. Now one may wonder how the Scorpion can be a positive thing for the month of Cheshvan? Our sages teach us the scorpion or Ak'rav נקרב is the deadliest member of the general category of poisonous creatures whose archetypal figure is the primordial snake of Eden. The Hebrew word for "scorpion." derives from the word meaning "heel" or Ah'kav אַקָב as is said in the Torah: "And you [the snake] shall bite him [man] at the heel" (Genesis 3:15). Thus the scorpion symbolizes the consummate "bite" of the snake at the heel of man. This biblical curse will all be negated with the coming of the Mashiach. According to the Gematria, the word "Mashiach" numerically adds up to 358. The word "scorpion" or Ak'rav עַקרב equals 372. The Mashiach is to be a descendent of David דָוָד whose value is 14. When you add 14 to 358, it equals the value of "scorpion". The nun is the 14th letter of the Hebrew alphabet which connects to the royalty of the Davidic dynasty.

Cheshvan has a tribal connection which is Menashe who was the firstborn son of Joseph and means "to forget" (literally "to leap, up and away"). Menashe represents the power of the "Tzadik" or the "righteous one" (referring to Joseph) who went through hardships, trials and tribulations in Egypt before rising to power. It is believed when the Mashiach comes, our hardships, trials and tribulations will be transformed into joy.

Out of all of the five senses, Cheshvan is associated with the sense of smell which is the most spiritual of all human senses. The Hebrew word for "smell" or Ray'ach ריה is similar to the word for "spirit" or Ru'ach רוה The sages teach us that smell is the one and only sense "the soul enjoys and not the body." The sense of smell is the only sense (of the five senses) that did not participate, and thereby was not blemished or polluted, in the primordial sin of man in the Garden of Eden. It is the "sense" which saved the Jewish people in the time of Mordechai and Esther, who are called Mor Ve'Hadas "myrrh and myrtle," the two primary sources of fragrance). Furthermore, it is explicitly stated the sense of the Mashiach is the sense of "smell". "And he shall smell with the awe of G-d"-"he shall judge by smell" (rather than by sight or hearing. Isaiah 11:3; Sanhedrin 93b). By his sense of smell (his "holy spirit"), the Mashiach will know how to connect each Jewish soul to its Divine root, and thereby identify its tribe (branch) in Israel.

Jewish Mysticism may seem way out there at times, but one cannot ignore the insight that has resulted from study of these ancient sages into this area of Jewish study. How they were able in their own time, without the help of computers, to connect these aspects to the Mashiach and the month of Cheshvan is remarkable. Each Hebrew month comes with its own level of Jewish Mysticism. Cheshvan does not stand alone.

So, the next time after High Holidays are over, and you think the dull month of Cheshvan is just the month before Kislev and the holiday of Chanukah, reflect on some good old Jewish Mysticism. You will find that just like the Sages of old, the more you put into your Judaism, the more you will get out of it. May you have a joyous Cheshvan, and may we all live to see the messianic fulfillment this month mystically represents.

President's Message

I am very happy to announce the recent exposure to Covid-19 at the synagogue has been resolved. Thankfully, everyone is fine and this event has passed without complications or spread of infections.

We are very excited to announce that the synagogue is open and we began conducting in-person services on Saturday, October 17, 2020.

It is important to note, precautions necessarily remain in place, as defined in the revised safety policy poster included in this bulletin for your convenience. Social distancing within the sanctuary and masks or face shields are still the key elements. However, I would like to report we never exceeded the attendance limit in place during the High Holidays. Based on our attendance since reopening, we have sufficient room to accommodate additional congregants and friends, while continuing to maintain safe distances between seating arrangements. So, we want you to feel welcome to attend. Although the total number of seats and seating arrangements are necessarily limited to approximately 35 adults and their accompanying children due to distancing requirements, we will gladly seat additional attendees as they arrive, so long as we can maintain one row and three seats between family groups and individuals.

Additionally, the Board has decided we will no longer require reservations for in-person services, making it possible for you to attend without advance planning or notification. Please arrive at 9:00 AM for services to assure your seat and to be present to help us make minyan for Torah services.

We invite you to enjoy in-person services and to help us make a minyan each Saturday. It is an especially exciting and important period for Congregation Ahavath Achim since one of our youth congregants is in the final moments of preparation for his Bar Mitzvah and he will be leading services along with the Rabbi through the end of October, at which time he will celebrate his bar mitzvah.

Your health is our priority during these challenging times. So, if you unable to safely attend services in person, then we encourage you to begin or to continue attending virtual services on-line. Our on-line YouTube channel is up and running with very good results, thus far. During the High Holiday season, we received more than 40 new subscribers to our channel, resulting in more than 500 views and more than 15,000 minutes of viewing time. I will distribute a survey to you in the next few days to assess your opinion relative to virtual services. In advance, CAA greatly appreciates your participation to help us improve the streaming service.

YOU ARE RESPONSIBLE for YOUR PERSONAL HEALTH CAREFULLY WEIGH RISKS BEFORE CHOOSING TO ATTEND SERVICES IN PERSON

Do not plan to attend services in-person if:

You currently have COVID-19; You know you have been exposed to COVID-19 within the last 14 days;

You have fever or have had fever within the last 14 days; You have health conditions that put you at increased risk

for COVID-19 infection/complications; You are unwilling, as a matter of personal choice, to wear a face mask or

face shield in the building.

All persons ten years of age and older are required to wear a mask at all times when in the synagogue. Wearing

a face shield that wraps around the sides of the wearer's face and extends below the chin is acceptable for those

persons who have personal medical or physical difficulties that prevent them from safely wearing a mask.

However, either a mask or a shield is required at all times in all locations, including the sanctuary, all hallways,

and other rooms within the synagogue building.


To reduce droplet spray effectively – sneeze/cough into your elbow, even when wearing a mask. Check your temperature at home just before you come to the synagogue to assure it is within the normal range. Use hand sanitizer immediately when you enter the synagogue. Wash your hands or use hand sanitizer before touching your eyes, nose, and mouth. Maintain at least six feet between you and other congregants. Family members may sit in seats beside each other but must socially distance six feet from other individuals. Seating arrangements require one empty row between occupied rows. Three empty seats are required between individuals and between individuals and family groups. Parents are responsible to supervise their children at all times and to assure the children comply with social distancing requirements when around other congregants who are not members of their family. Notify the synagogue in advance by phone or email if you plan to attend services. Seating is limited to 35 adults with accompanying minor children during services until further notice due to social distancing requirements.

NOTICE – You are responsible for your own health. The synagogue is not responsible for and cannot assure your health and safety relative to COVID-19 exposure. COVID-19 can be totally without symptoms in some people (asymptomatic). An asymptomatic person carrying active COVID-19 may be completely unaware that they have the virus, which is why everyone is required to wear a mask or face shield when inside the synagogue to protect themselves AND others. Additionally, if you are in a high-risk group or have health issues, we strongly recommend that you weigh your specific risks very carefully before choosing to attend services or other group activities.
