From The Desk of The Rabbi Miracles; How Do They Happen?

There are many trains of thought that run through my mind when the holiday of Chanukah arrives. Even though it is not a biblical holiday as commanded to perform in the Torah, it is a holiday of great spiritual significance when one understands what was nearly lost forever. When one studies the history of this holiday, it has all the makings of a holocaust for it's time and when we investigate into the stories of what the Syrian-Greek ruler Antiochus did to the Jewish people under his tyrannical rule, it is truly a miracle that Judaism survived the onslaught of that time.

Antiochus was not an Alexander. In fact, history teaches us that under Alexander's rule of our ancient land, Judaism thrived under his leadership. It was not uncommon for Jewish people to name their sons after this individual. The Hellenistic way of life had a great influence on our people of that time. So much so, the Torah was translated to Greek by the 70 Rabbis under the rule of Ptolemy II. While hailed as a great achievement (all 70 translations were exactly the same word for word), this influenced many not so positive results.

Many Jewish people started studying the Greek arts and sciences, they wore Greek clothing, and many assimilated into the Greek way of life known as Hellenism. However, for many of our people, we remained steadfast in our belief that Hashem was the only true G-D for our people and that the pagan Greek polytheistic religion was not to be embraced under any circumstances. Alexander's policy of conquering was to preserve the religions and cultures of the nations that he conquered thereby winning the hearts of the people that would be his subjects. Antiochus however, viewed any other religion and culture especially Judaism as a threat to his goal to make the known conquered world at that time Greek in all ways with no exceptions.

When Antiochus started his reign of terror against the Jewish people, he spared no expense as to the level of cruelty that could be afflicted against our people. There is the historical account of Hannah and her seven sons who would not submit to the decrees of this tyrant. She watched as each one of her sons was put to death before her very eyes because they would not abandon the Jewish faith. How many thousands of our people were killed in this manner?

Our religious rituals were banned by the decrees of this tyrant. The Torah was forbidden to be read publicly and studied. Circumcision was outlawed. Jewish women who would have their infant sons circumcised in defiance of Antiochus' decrees against any Jewish observance were murdered and their babies publicly hanged. Such was the onslaught of this unrelenting cruel tyrant who came very close to destroying the Jewish people forever. Resistance was slowly but surely becoming less and less against this new enemy of our people, and assimilation to the Greek Hellenistic way of life seemed inevitable.

Mattathias of Modin and his sons took charge and placed our people back on course. Mattathias' actions towards the Jew who was ready to publicly embrace all that was Greek rivaled what Pinchas did so many hundreds of years before. In a single zealous act, Mattathias brought the Jewish nation back into reality. Under the strong leadership of his son Judah Maccabee, the struggle for religious freedom and regaining



the Temple and Jerusalem was fought and won. This miracle along with the other miracles such as the oil lasting for eight days during the rededication of the Holy Temple in 165 BCE has been one of the most inspiring stories that we narrate to our children and ourselves every year since.

We see today in the modern state of Israel that our fellow Jewish brethren are continually threatened by Syria, Hamas, Islamic Jihad, Hezbollah, and especially Iran. Fatah is not innocent either. These countries and terrorist groups who are dedicated to the destruction of Israel are unlike the ancient Syrian-Greeks who just wanted to subjugate and assimilate the Jewish people. This generation of enemies that Israel faces today have no desire to coexist under any circumstances with the Jewish people.

On the flip side though, we unfortunately see a great divide between the secular and religious in not just Israel, but in our own country today. The BDS movement is not helping the cause against Israel's enemies who seek to destroy Israel. How anyone can look at Israel and compare it to the Apartheid of South Africa is beyond me. Let us not forget how life was under the Islamic rule of the Ottoman Empire. How our memories become so short in the course of two or more generations.

The Ultra-Orthodox Haredim who live in Israel and others like them refuse to support Israel's military and defend the country. The few that do are persecuted by their own movement. What has happened to our people? Between both extremes, there is too much politics, and not enough unity for the common good of the people. Is the Sinat Chinam; the baseless hatred of Jew against Jew to plague us over and over again?

The miracles of Chanukah that we commemorate by lighting the Chanukiah are powerful messages to our people for all generations past, present, and future. But these miracles happened because the Maccabees did everything in their power as physically possible together to warrant Hashem's presence to come back into the Temple; hence the miracle of the oil, and the defeat of the Syrian/Greek oppressors. With the existential threat of Iran's nuclear program, Syria's, Hamas, Islamic Jihad, and Hezbollah's continuing terrorist attacks against the Jewish State, Israel and Diaspora Jewry must present a united front of support if we expect the modern-day miracle of the State of Israel to continue.

This year as we light our candles every night, we will say our usual blessings along with the traditional songs such as Maoz Tzur and Al Hanisim. This year as in previous years, I believe we should continue to recite an additional blessing before singing these songs and it should follow after the traditional blessings. The blessing is as follows: "Baruch Atah Adoshem, Elokeinu Melech Ha-Olam, Ozer Yisrael Bi'G'Vurah" We say this blessing in our morning prayers every morning and it translates in English as such: "Blessed are you L-d our G-D, King of The Universe, who strengthens the people Israel with courage".

I believe it will take courage like never before for our brothers and sisters in the land of Eretz Yisrael to endure what is to come in near future. It will take courage for many of the remaining Jewish people who live in the Diaspora of European countries who are still seeing the rise of anti-Semitism and suffer under the onslaught of attacks against their right to live and practice their faith. It will take courage for Israel itself to have leaders that will know their Tanach and their history as well as the lessons that come with that knowledge.

We must, as Jews who live in this country, continue in the best way possible to elect leaders who will continue to support Israel and we must pray for them to have strength to govern wisely so we and the next generation and all generations to follow will continue to say those beautiful words: "Am Yisrael Chai"!
