From The Desk of The Rabbi

"LIVING IN TWO WORLDS"

Recently, I watched a documentary on the Roman Empire and during the time of Julius Caesar's reign, the current solar calendar used by most of the world today was established. While this was a great achievement for the Roman Empire, there was a certain number of pagan/human connections that made up this calendar. For example; July and August were named after Julius and Augustus Caesar. January was named after the Roman deity Janus. February was named after the Roman festival of purification called Februa. March was named after Mars, the Roman deity of war. I think you can get the picture here.

However, we the Jewish people live according to the rhythm of two different calendars – the secular and the sacred. The night of December 31 is an exciting time in one secular tradition, but meaningless in the sacred. And at the same time, the first of Tishri takes on universal spiritual meaning for us Jews, but has no meaning for the non-Jewish secular world. This duality certainly presents many challenges for the Jewish world and for most of us Diaspora Jews, we tend to rely on the secular calendar most of the time and it certainly makes us think and check when our holidays are going to occur.

While they are always on the same Hebrew calendar date, they do not occur on the same day of the secular calendar. Chanukah is all over the month of December and sometimes starting at the end of November. Same for all the Chagim in their perspective secular months. Shavuot could fall in either May or June. Pesach could fall in either March or April. Rosh Hashanah could fall as early as the beginning of September or as late as early October.

Fortunately, the Jewish people were given a calendar by Hashem and through the watchful care and calculations of our sages, we see the world differently every month of our calendar and we have a different perspective of the term "New Year".

According to the Mishneh, and I have mentioned this before, there are four different new years: one for spring (Nisan), one for accounting or "taking stock of your life" (Elul, originally for taking stock of the livestock for sacrifices), one for the birthday of the world and humanity (Tishri), and one for trees (Shevat). On January 17th, we will celebrate Tu B'Shevat, the New Year for trees.

In the context of the rhythm of our secular calendar, January is a "winter" month. Celebrating a new year for trees in the height of winter seems, at best, counterproductive. The trees around us are bare, even here in Texas. Their green leaves turn brown and have fallen off. Branches sway perilously in winter winds, and we feel what most consider to be winter descend upon us. From a northern perspective, Ellen and I consider winter here an extended fall. The -6 degrees of last February was the closest in our 15+ years of living in Tyler that we could definitely say; "It's winter outside". This year, as I compose this month's article in December, it's in the 70's. At this time, I'm thinking that the trees may start budding here by Tu B'Shevat like they traditionally do in Israel.

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PRESIDENTS MESSAGE

What does the number 10 mean to you? Maybe the first thing that comes to mind is the Ten Commandments. You may consider the 10 tests that Hashem gave to Abraham. Or when Abraham was negotiating to save the destruction of Sodom due the merit of at least 10 righteous people who lived there. You may even consider the Ten Plaques. The tenth letter in the Alaf Beis is the letter yud which is a reference to G-d. In this view, I am considering the need for 10 men and women who are needed for the Minyan. In Orthodox circles, the Minyan requires 10 Jewish men over the age of Bar Mitzvah. In our Conservative synagogue, we consider Jewish men and women over the age of 12 for women and 13 for men to count toward the 10 required for a Minyan. The quorum of 10 represents the community. The biblical source for the requirement of 10 to complete the Minyan comes from the time that Moses sent spies to scout the land of Canaan. Ten of them returned and issued a report concluding that it was not a conquerable land. G-d was disappointed with their lack of faith. G-d questions Moses as to how long will this evil assembly complain against him. Thus we learn that an assembly or congregation comprises of 10. An assembly of 10 is required when G-d is being sanctified in public reading of the Torah and Haftorah. There are several other prayers that require the presence of 10 constituting a Minyan. This discussion leads me to the main message that I am addressing. It takes a long time for us on Shabbos to obtain a Minyan and sometimes we do not achieve this goal. This is important for us to have a Minyan to have our quorum and to have our community. It is important to be able to read from the Torah to understand our History, our Heritage, and learn the message that Hashem is giving us. The services on Shabbos are for all of us. I look forward to seeing more of you. Shabbat Shalom.


But, Tu B'Shevat reminds us that the rhythm of the Jewish calendar, which is how the Jewish people measure their spiritual existence, is ever present in our lives. Even though we may find ourselves in the "dead of winter" (and I say that with tongue and cheek) here in Texas, in Israel, where is it also winter, the first and earliest harbinger of spring has already arrived. Life is starting to come back to the land.

In Israel, one can see the first hints of color that will fill the landscape in the coming months. Anyone who has spent the winter in Israel knows that this period of time can drain the spirit and numb the hands due the amount of rainy days during this time. But Tu B'Shevat, like a strangely warm day in March provides premonitions of better and warmer days to come.

After the barrage of secular holidays that have come and gone, Tu B'Shevat comes along to remind us that we are Jews and we are connected to our land, and to our faith. As we continue in this new secular year and as we recover from the traditional onslaught of the "holiday season", Tu B'Shevat is a healthy reminder for the need to strike a balance between living in the secular world and find meaning and sustenance from the spiritual world.

I think it would be a wonderful idea to keep this in mind as we prepare to celebrate Tu B'Shevat this year. If Tu B'Shevat is true to its secular date, it will, in all probability, be cooler outside. But if we allow the sacred calendar of the Jewish year to work its magic on us, maybe, just maybe, we can imagine how good it will be to feel warm and for it to be spring-like, with almond trees in bloom, and G-d's blessings descending upon earth.


