From The Desk of The Rabbi

All of our holidays have different themes. They are designed to remind us of the covenant consisting of Hashem, the Torah and the Jewish people. Each holiday has a specific purpose if not a history as well. The Talmud categorizes our holidays as biblical or Talmudic, Sabbatical or non Sabbatical, full or half (Chol Hamoed), festival or fast. If you really think about it, just as the Rabbi in the movie Fiddler on The Roof said; "There is a blessing for everything", we as Jewish people seem to have a holiday for everything. We have a holiday every week to rest. We have a holiday to celebrate the creation of the world. We have a holiday to atone for our iniquities. We have a holiday to celebrate the harvest (also to camp out). We have a holiday to celebrate freedom. We have a holiday to celebrate the receiving of the commandments. The list goes on and on. It seems that the Rabbis like most of us really enjoyed any reason to celebrate. A common tradition is that if something significant happened in our past, this gave our sages an excuse to create a holiday whereby we would learn our history by celebrating it. This could not be truer than the holiday of Purim.

What do we call Purim? Is the story of Purim about a beautiful Jewish woman (Esther) who risks her life for her people to save them from destruction? Is it about a Jewish man (Mordechai) who knows how to be in the right place at the right time to put all the political pieces in place so he can out maneuver the villain of the story? Is it the story of how the hatred of one individual (Haman) can spark and incite others to that same kind of hatred to the point of committing genocide? Is it the story of how a ruler (King Achashverosh) can become so out of touch with his country and people that through drunken debauchery he can remove his spouse (Queen Vashti) and sign edicts to destroy people without questioning the ethical and moral reasoning for his action? Is it a story of how a subjugated people were given the right to bear arms, defend themselves and destroy the very people who plotted to destroy them? What is the appropriate title that we should give to this holiday?

No matter where you are at in history, the time preceding it shapes it. The Shabbat preceding Purim is called Shabbat Zachor or the Shabbat of Remembrance. What significance does this special Shabbat (one of four) before Pesach have to do with Purim? How does this special Shabbat shape the holiday of Purim? What does it mean "Shabbat of Remembrance"? The answer of course can be found in the Torah.

One of the Mitzvot we are commanded by Hashem to do is to "Remember what Amalek did to you, on the way when you were leaving Egypt, that he happened upon you on the way, and he struck those of you who were hindmost, all the weaklings at your rear, when you were faint and exhausted, and he did not fear Hashem. It shall be that when Hashem, your G-D, gives you rest from all your enemies all around, in the land that Hashem your G-D, gives you as an inheritance to possess it, you shall wipe out the memory of Amalek from under the heaven-**You Shall Not Forget**!"(Devarim Ch. 25, vs. 17-19).

Amalek was the prototypical anti-Semite. Although there were previous people in our history that attempted to destroy the Jewish people prior to Amalek, none had previously done so out of cowardly hatred. Laban had attempted to destroy Jacob out of pride and jealousy. Pharoah had tried to assimilate the Hebrew nation into Egyptian society by killing the male children but had no desire to destroy the entire nation whereby he would have lost a considerable slave labor force. Amalek allowed hate to drive him to do terrible things to people who were unable to defend themselves.

There will be simple things that will allow us to gain insight into an individuals condition such as a digital BP/HR device. Along this line of thinking, I encourage everyone to carry a sheet or 3x5 cards with the list of their medications, allergies and doctors. This will also help convey information quickly to EMS when they arrive. This list or cards should be in your purse or wallet and easily accessible. If you have suggestions about this, please contact me or other members of the board.



We see this parallel with Haman the Agagite who was a descendant of Amalek. Just like Amalek, Haman deviously attacks the Jewish people by cowardly means and sets the stage for our people's destruction all because of hate. Such is the nature of individuals who do not fear Hashem. They represent the ultimate manifestation of evil. They stop at nothing to achieve their evil designs against humanity even at the risk of their own destruction and the destruction of others who rally to their cause.

Although there are many themes that Purim represents, the main theme is that Anti-Semitism never seems to die. It rises, it flourishes, it takes the world to the brink of destruction and eventually is subdued by righteous people who finally band together to defeat it. However, many times this does not happen until non-Jewish people are caught and swept up in that same hatred. Anti-Semitism seems to be only the beginning of that hatred. Eventually evil becomes less discriminatory and extends this hate and turns it on everybody who does not wish to conform to it. We see this happening not only in Iran today, but in the European countries as well as in the United States. Even Russia in the beginning stages of the invasion of Ukraine takes the position that the Golan Heights is Syrian Territory and not Israeli Territory. Is Russia along with Iran and Syria the new "Haman" of our generation?



Our Sunday School gang had a blast learning about the mitzvah of Bal Tashchit, Havdallah, and baking tiny challah. This was so fun and easy that we wanted to share the recipe. Using frozen dough means you are always ready to bake challah for Shabbat or Yom Tov.

Quick and Easy Mini Challah

Ingredients: Rhodes brand frozen Yeast Dinner Rolls (kosher Parve) 1 whole egg a little bit of time and patience :)



Directions:

1. The night before you want to bake your challah, place your dinner rolls on a plate to thaw in the refrigerator. In the morning the dough will be ready to shape.

2. For one mini challah you will need three pieces of dough, i.e. three dinner rolls. Shape each piece of dough into a long snake.

3. Once you have three "snakes" of dough you are ready to braid your loaf.

4. Place your braided loaf onto a prepared baking sheet. Cover loaf with a towel and wait for the dough to rise. It should take 1 to 2 hours, but this will vary based on the temperature of your room.

5. Once your dough has risen you can beat one egg and brush the egg onto the top of your loaf. You can also add poppy seeds or sesame seeds on top.

6. Bake in a 350 degree oven for about 15 minutes. Your loaf should be golden brown on top. Enjoy!
