From The Desk of The Rabbi LIBERATION PROCEEDS IN STAGES

One of the characteristics of youth is impatience. While older adults are tempered by the realities of human passivity and inertia, young people agitate for immediate change and progress. Unwilling to concede that society moves very slowly, unable to accept human suffering and callousness, our colleges remain centers of agitation and protest as young people attempt to translate their dreams of a redeemed humanity into a living reality.

Let us imagine Moses as a young man plagued with this same impatience. Having to watch his people suffer under the strains of Egyptian slavery must have been a tortuous agony. Whether Moses identified completely with his people or not, we know from the Torah narrative that in his youth, he was so passionate about his people and justice that he did not hesitate to intervene to redress grievances and to assist the weak and the needy. Did Moses, like us in our time, pray for divine assistance? Even as a Prince of Egypt, he could not alter the politics of his government. After all, the Jews had been slaves in Egypt for over 200 years, and there was no sign of the Egyptian dynasty relenting at all.

Finally after nearly 80 years of life experience, Moses encounters G-d, the Ancient Holy One. In the process of liberating the Jewish people, G-d also teaches him and us a lesson in persistence. Liberation comes in stages, not all at once. Permanent change in human nature requires time, patience and determination. Cosmetic alterations may come easily, but permanent and significant growth emerges over a long period, and only with great effort.

The Torah in Parsha Va'era describes G-d telling the Jewish people: "I am the L-d, I will free you from the labors of the Egyptians and I will deliver you from their bondage. I will redeem you with an outstretched arm and through extraordinary chastisements. And I will take you to be My people and I will be your G-d."

These four verses of liberation, "*I will free you*... *I will deliver you*... *I will redeem you*... *I will take you*," became the single paradigmatic emblem of Jewish redemption. According to Midrash Shemot Rabbah, The Sages ordained four cups to be drunk on the eve of Pesach to correspond with these four expressions, in order to fulfill the verse: "*I raise the cup of deliverance and invoke the name of the L-d (Psalm 116: 13).*" Thus, each cup of wine at the Seder represents a different aspect of the process of liberation. The Ramban (13th Century Spain) states: "*Each aspect of deliverance marks an advance toward the goal of complete freedom.*"

Thus, the first step, **"I will free you,"** refers to the cessation of external bondage. The first prerequisite for any human freedom is that external oppression cease. However, the absence of outside pressure is not in itself freedom.

The next step, **"I will deliver you,"** refers to leaving the sovereignty and control of the former oppressors. Remaining under their influence, even if no longer under their servitude, precludes true liberation.

The third stage of freedom, **"I will redeem you,"** involves a reorientation of values. It is through the mighty acts which accomplished the Exodus from Egypt, the signs and wonders that the Israelites came to understand that human pomp and pretension were unable to provide ultimate meaning and value. The temptations of Egyptian society were, in the final analysis, mere glitter and distraction from what made life ultimately significant. **RABBI'S MESSAGE CONTINUES ON PAGE 6**

PRESIDENTS MESSAGE

Of all the Jewish Holidays, Passover has always been my favorite. The entire house changed. Our regular food closet was cleaned out and Chametz was removed, the house was thoroughly cleaned and the dishes changed out. The morning of the first seder, we were not allowed to eat in the house.

It was also a tradition for my Dad would take us out to the local donut shop for breakfast and then take us to school. The first Seder was usually at my Bubbe's house. We had the immediate family but also the adopted family. These were the extra aunts and uncles, and grandparents who were my grandparents' friends. There were always extra friends as well.

Since my Zayde died when I was 4 year old, my uncle ran the Seder. There was lots of commotion but everyone was happy. Most importantly, there were the smells from the kitchen. Both my mother and Bubbe had been cooking all day.

We would go through the Seder with everyone participating and I had to do the Four Questions until my brother and cousins were able to do them. Not only was the story told, we sang together, told jokes and everyone ate their fill. From the very beginning, this was a special time. One year, Uncle Sam decided to get my younger brother a little shicker with the full four cups of wine. Another year, my uncle had a colleague of his dress up as Elijah. When my younger cousin opened the door, Elijah came in and said hello to everyone and had some wine and then left.

It has been a tradition in many homes to have a collection of Haggadahs that had been used over the years. If I had to describe all the food, I would end up writing pages. During that week, I ate all my favorite foods. By the way, my Bubbe and her generation had to be the ones who invented the 20 course meal! I used to think Passover meant passover the plate of chopped liver etc.

As I got older, the seriousness of the holiday became important. The universal message of wanting to be free and the universal human goal of freedom. The holiday of Passover is probably the first holiday to celebrate the gift of freedom by any people.

Hashem also taught us this gift had a price. We lost people along our way in the desert. We had to learn to accept this gift and understand the importance of it. Not all our people were willing to accept it. The incident of the golden calf taught us what Hashem wanted us to accept.

We have also learned over time, we must continue to fight for our freedom such that every generation must accept this gift and the responsibilities it gives us. One such responsibility has been to help the freedom of all people.

Perhaps, the requirement to keep the Passover Seder was to ensure that every generation be taught this is a gift and responsibilities that this gift meant. In some ways, the war in the Ukraine is a reminder of this universal message.

I hope everyone has a wonderful, joyous and yet meaningful Passover.

The moment of redemption was that time when Israel realized that ultimate worth -- the goal of the religious endeavor -- came in serving something ultimate, rather than furthering any human conceit.

The fourth stage of freedom, **"I will take you to be My people,"** refers, according to the Bekhor Shor (12th Century, France), to the meeting of G-d and Israel at Mount Sinai. Ultimately, freedom is much, much more than the absence of external restraint. Freedom is the ability to assume responsibility for one's own life and for one's community as well. We are most free, most fully human, when we help ourselves and others to live up to our best potential as caring human beings and as serious Jews.

Thus, the freedom of Torah -- the only true freedom that Jews can enjoy -- is a call to responsibility, toward spiritual adulthood. By assuming responsibility for the 'Mitzvot,' by taking our place in the unbroken chain of Jewish observance, tradition and transmission, we renew the ancient process of liberation which our ancestors experienced in Egypt. We observe and celebrate Pesach and our Seders which renew our commitment to that process of liberation. When each of us proceeds through the stages of liberation, we exchange the modern-day Pharaoh of materialism and the contemporary idolatry of the self with the purifying service of the Holy Blessed One and acts of love toward our fellow human beings. The process begins anew today just as holiday of Pesach symbolizes renewal. It calls to all of us.

SALE OF CHAMETZ - DEADLINE THURSDAY, APRIL 14th 2022 Any Chametz owned by a Jew during Passover Week becomes "Trefa" and is forbidden for actual use or benefit forever. It is usually impossible to dispose of all Chametz before Passover, so every Jew should arrange for a formal Mechirat Chametz, or sale of that Chametz. Definition of CHAMETZ:

In Exodus 12:15 the Bible tells us, "Seven days you shall eat unleavened bread; on the very first day you shall remove leaven from your houses..." The Rabbis specified five grains which can become chametz: wheat, barley, spelt, rye, and oats. Ashkenazic authorities added to this list rice and kitniot, or legumes (including beans, peas, lentils, corn and maize, millet, and mustard). Sephardic authorities, prohibit only the five specified grains, thus Sephardic Jews are allowed to eat legumes and rice during Passover.


