From The Desk of The Rabbi Accountability

At this time of the year, we are either about to or have started into the reading of Sefer Bamidbar. Bamidbar offers at the beginning of the book a wondrous detailed accounting of the people (the males), specifically the numeric values concerning a census for the sole purpose of establishing the military force which will soon go into the land and conquer it.

Out of my daily dose of Torah series which dwells on Parsha Bamidbar, the Mussar thought for the day offers this teaching which comes from the *Shelah Hakadosh* (Rabbi Isaiah Horowitz) who wrote: "Every single member of the Jewish nation is a vital component of it, and each Jew is critical to the Jewish people as if everything revolved around them alone. We must believe this, and act accordingly. As *Chazal* (our sages of blessed memory) have taught us, a person must look at the world as if it is half worthy and half unworthy. Thus, if he or she alone were to sin they would tip the scales toward the unworthy, and if he or she were to do just one mitzvah they would tip the scale toward holiness. One must look at themselves as if they had the power to change the world with their deeds, and thus bring favor to the Jewish people and light to the world, in the eyes of Hashem."

Not only did this concept apply to our lives in years past, but now more than ever does it apply to our time today. We see many situations in the world today where people are waiting for the other person to act when it comes down to promoting peace and harmony in the world. The current conflict between Russia and Ukraine is a prime example of this. We can operate on the premise that as Jews, each of us receives special Divine providence from Hashem because we are Hashem's beloved people, but that does not give us the right of entitlement in believing that that providence is owed to us.

In fact, we must reciprocate and use the unique stature we have been given for the purpose of being in service to Hashem and our fellow man. We must look at the perspective as if we ourselves were the only person in the world and our actions were the only ones capable of bringing pleasure to the Creator. We cannot wait or use the excuse: "Leave it up to someone else to do." It is because of this unique stature we have been given which drives and motivates our people to be successful in most of all the endeavors we pursue. It is the actions of one that bears great significance either positive or negative on the Jewish people and the world.

The book of Bamidbar is more than just an accounting numerically of a people; it is a book of how we as the Jewish people should be held accountable for our actions in the first place. This also should transfer to the rest of the world as well. Last month, a Palestinian Journalist, Shireen Abu Akleh was killed while live reporting at a IDF military raid in the city of Jenin. Immediately the Palestinian officials are quick to blame IDF forces for her death. Yet, they will not release the bullet that killed her. How can there be any accountability when the anti-Semitism and hate of the Palestinian leadership is so strong, it prevents a complete and thorough investigation to determine the facts of this terrible tragedy?

We continue to see anti-Semitism, Holocaust denial, and a growing nuclear Iran not just threaten Israel and all Jews throughout the world, but all people who live on this planet. When Russia's Foreign Minister, Sergei Lavrov repeats the old anti-Semitic tropes, where is the accountability of these libelous statements being made by world leaders and their governments. And the leaders of not only this country and others have the Chutzpah to say that peace in the Middle East is still contingent on whether or not Israel makes

PRESIDENTS MESSAGE

Where is the Jewish Community? When I was growing up, there was no question about where it was. I grew up in the greater Detroit area that was rich in Judaism. We had a large Jewish population with many synagogues, a Jewish Community Center, several Hebrew schools and a Yiddish newspaper. I was part of the third generation in my family to participate. I had the opportunity to see my grandparents and my parents be active in the community. Of course, I would be active. I went to public school that was at least 40 % Jewish along with my Hebrew school education.

It may take a village to raise a child. In my case, it took a Jewish community to raise my generation. But what is happening now? Times have changed in many ways. We are more dispersed and isolated. There is a whole new meaning to the diaspora when we think of the Jewish community in East Texas. Where will the next generations learn of their heritage? The COVID pandemic has also led to this sense of isolation, Jewish or not. We have a gift and we are losing it if we do not act.

A sort of funny story is when I was interviewing a Jewish cardiologist and his wife from New York. They came to my small town of Athens to interview. His wife asked where is the Jewish Community Center and I quickly replied, "my backyard." That was the truth. The interview was over that quickly as well.

But for those of us who have chosen to live in East Texas, we have the challenge to create, maintain and support a sense of Jewish Community. We need a place to connect and to educate ourselves and the next generation. This place is the synagogue. Throughout our history, the synagogue is still the center of the community. It is definitely more difficult to come to the synagogue and to participate given the distances that many of us live from the synagogue. We will have to be more creative in solving this. And in doing so, we must involve our children and grandchildren. They will learn by watching us participate in the fulfillment of our community.

So please join us for services and participate in the many different activities. Become a partner with us in building up the Sisterhood and Brotherhood and our school programs for the children. Come to Torah study after services and learn more of our history. As we become more active in our Jewish community, we will find our strength and the gift from Hashem.

peace with the Palestinians?

Anti-Semitism will not just go away if we make peace with the Palestinians. The fallout from the death of Shireen Abu Akleh, the conflict of Jewish prayer on the Temple mount, and the current drive of the "Squad" in Washington to pass a resolution officially recognizing Nakba Day reminds us we are a long way away from achieving that goal.

Israel is a modern-day miracle plain and simple. It doesn't exist because the world leaders told the Jewish people they had to negotiate with the Arab nations for existence. Israel exists because the Jewish people became accountable for their own destiny and demanded the right to survive. This is the right of all human beings in this world especially this country. Would we in this country for the sake of peace, return all lands and territories captured in wars and return to our original boundaries of the 13 colonies? I think we all know the answer to that question.

History is being made before our very eyes just as it has been made in our parents' time and the generations before them. How will history measure our accountability in the times ahead? We can only hope and pray Hashem will give us the means to perform Mitzvot that will reflect holiness and allow us to tip the scales where our positive deeds will bring blessing and favor to not just the Jewish people, but to the world as well.


